### Grand Circular Walk



#### via the Escarpment Walk

The Main Walk is a long and demanding journey out to the Cotswold escarpment and back. Along the way, you will have stunning views, pass through three particularly charming and bucolic Cotswold villages – Stanway, Stanton and Snowhill. There is a slightly shorter alternate ending that brings you past Broadway Tower before descending into Broadway from where you will need to organise a taxi back to Moreton-in-Marsh.

### Diamond Way Walk



A roughly diamond shaped walk visiting many small villages using quiet footpaths. Imaginative and scenic route through rural Gloucestershire, created by the RA's North Cotswold Group to celebrate the 60th Jubilee in 1995. Stretches from Northleach in the south to near Chipping Campden in the north, Guiting Power in the west to near Bourton-on-the-Water in the east.

### Monarch's Way Walk



Following the western edge of the Cotswold Hills, the route journeys through rolling pastures, beech woodland and honey-coloured villages built from Cotswold stone. You will explore ancient commons in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, pass Neolithic burial barrows, stately homes and historic battle sites. The stunning path along the Cotswold escarpment offers ever-changing views to the west towards the River Severn and the Malvern Hills.

## Lots to discover

Moreton-in-Marsh, offers a charming blend of history, architecture, and natural beauty. Explore the historic High Street, lined with buildings dating back to the 17th and 18th centuries, including the iconic Redesdale Market Hall and a variety of independent businesses, each offering its own unique charm and character - notable ones include: The Bell, The Cotswold Cheese Company, the Cotswolds Snug and the Moreton Gallery. Visit the vibrant weekly market, showcasing local produce and artisan crafts.



### 801 Bus Route Westbound

HEADING TO STOW-ON-THE-WOLD,  
BOURTON-ON-THE-WATER & CHELTENHAM

The 801 bus route is timetabled to connect with trains at Moreton-in-Marsh station, and operates every hour on Mondays to Saturdays, and every 2 hours on Sundays and Bank Holidays. The bus stop is in the station car park, just a few steps from platform 1.

Hop on board the 801 and enjoy a trip along the ancient Roman Fosseway to the quintessentially English market town of Stow-on-the-Wold, or visit the "Venice of the Cotswolds" at Bourton-on-the-Water for a stroll alongside the river Windrush.

### 801 Bus Route Eastbound

HEADING TO CHIPPING NORTON

The 801 bus route is timetabled to connect with trains at Moreton-in-Marsh station, and extends every hour on Mondays to Saturdays to Chipping Norton, a lively Cotswold market town with many great places to eat and drink, and splendid architecture to enjoy.

It's a great base for walking too - get off the bus at Salford for a 5 mile circular walk to visit the mysterious prehistoric Rollright stones.

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### National Cycle Route 48

FROM SOUTHAM TO TETBURY

Cycle Route 48 is a picturesque 74-mile journey through charming market towns and serene countryside, ideal for nature enthusiasts. The route starts in Tetbury and passes through Cirencester, Northleach, Moreton-in-Marsh, and Southam. This signed cycle route includes a mixture of quiet roads and some traffic free paths.

### National Cycle Route 442

FROM WORCESTER TO OXFORD

Cycle Route 442 is a scenic 53-mile journey featuring beautiful countryside, historic villages, and quiet lanes, making it a delightful journey for cyclists. The route follows part of the Cotswold Line railway, starting from Worcester and ending in Hanborough, Oxfordshire and is divided into two main sections: Section 1 Worcester to Hinton on the Green, and Section 2 Hinton on the Green to Honeybourne, then to Long Hanborough. Moreton-in-Marsh, sits in section 2 and leads to Kingham and Charlbury, entering Cornbury Park (permissive cycle access, not in winter). The route splits into two braids at Ashford Bridge, then rejoins, leading to the A4095 shared-use cycle path to Hanborough station.

## Revolution Cafe



Known as home of North Cotswolds Cycling Club. This buzzing café serves up excellent food and drinks. Cotswolds Cycles is located here offering a range of cycles (hybrid or standard). For an additional charge they can deliver and collect. All hire includes a helmet, hi-vis jacket, lights, locks, basic equipment to change a puncture and pannier bags if required. You can also leave your bags here.
